I am an internationally recognised researcher in political economy and public policy and have worked collaboratively with UK policing and criminal justice organisations since 2012. My work has appeared in leading journals across economics, criminology, public health, law and psychiatry. I direct P-ACE LAB, the UKRI–NPCC Policing Academic Centre of Excellence, and the University of Birmingham’s Centre for Crime, Justice and Policing. I am a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences and a member of the Police Science Council. I have authored more than fifty articles, a book and numerous policy reports, and was a named PI or Co-I on awards worth approximately £10m during 2020–2026.
